I can describe how some online information can be opinion and can offer examples. I can explain how and why some people may present opinions as facts, and why the popularity of an opinion or the personalities of those promoting it does not necessarily make it true, fair or perhaps even legal. I can define the terms 'influence', 'manipulation' and 'persuasion' and explain how someone might encounter these online, for example advertising, ad targeting and targeting for fake news. I understand the concept of persuasive design and how it can be used to influences peoples' choices. I can demonstrate how to analyse and evaluate the validity of facts and information, and I can explain why using these strategies is important. I can explain how companies and news providers target people with online news stories they are more likely to engage with and how to recognise this. I can describe the difference between online misinformation and disinformation. I can explain why information that is on a large number of sites may still be inaccurate or untrue. I can assess how this might happen, for example the sharing of misinformation or disinformation. I can identify, flag and report inappropriate content.
